ABSTRACT

The collection has been made for Music in the North, the Nordic Science Center for Amateur Music, Danish Orchestra Conductors and the Science Center for Conducting. The vision in the field of amateur music is to collect and promote research in the activities of voluntary amateur music life, and significance for and influence on the individual in a societal context with a focus on social, psychological aspects, creative and health aspects. In short, to look at the health effects when pursuing music.

The vision in the conducting area is to collect and promote research into the significance of conducting for and influence on both the individual conductor and on music performers.

INTRODUCTION

Welcome to this collection of research conducted in the field of voluntary amateur music and including the direction of the active performers of amateur music.

The collection refers directly to reports, studies and articles in the field in recent decades in and outside the Nordic region. The collection is of course not complete but constitutes a significant selection for inspiration and development of amateur music life. This report includes the first collection of *440 research results within the impact of music on body, mind and behavior from January 2021*.

The collection was made for the Nordic Science Center for Amateur Music and the Science Center for Conducting by researcher, Henriette Schøn, Ph.D.

The vision is to collect and promote research in the activities of voluntary amateur music life. What significance do these have for the individual in a societal context - with a focus on social, psychological, creative and health aspects.

The vision is to collect and promote research on both the individual conductor and the musicians.

Conducting an orchestra or choir borders on topics such as music and theater studies, psychology, sociology, pedagogy, didactics, anthropology, rhetoric, communication, management, acoustics, medicine, oral health, ergonomics, audiology, neurology, brain research, labor market studies, etc.

More knowledge and training of conductors means better music practice, and then conductors and musicians form a musical ecosystem - a musical circuit.

The association behind the Science Center for Conducting is The Association of Danish Orchestra Conductors, and the association behind the Nordic Knowledge Center for Amateur Music is Music in the North.

1. **CONDUCTING** – Themes no. 1-37 (197 titles) – p. 1-45
In this section of the research collection, you will find everything that is related with the field of conducting, and the 37 research themes are covering a vast span of all research areas pertaining to various angles of conducting.
2. **MUSIC & HEALTH** – Themes no. 38-39 (399 titles) – p. 46-120
Here in this part of the research collection the focus is on music and the human health, and music's excellent effect on people with insomnia.
3. **MUSIC & CHILDREN & YOUNG PEOPLE** – Theme nr. 40 (273 titles) – p. 121-163
Here in theme no. 40 of the collection in theme the focus is on music's influence on children and young people during education and life.
4. **MUSIC & SPECIAL TOPICS** – Themes nr. 41- 43 (61 titles) – p. 164-174
In this section of the research collection music and many special topics are studied. These topics are important, but are a bit different from the above themes, and therefore has gotten their own category. In theme no. 41 a definition of what a musician is, and in theme no. 42 the relation between music and the citizen is studied, and finally in theme no. 43 looking into the relationship between intelligence and music preferences are made.
