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ABSTRACT

The collection of research has been made for Music in the North and the Nordic Science Center for Amateur Music. The collection of more than 200 research articles is based on the idea catalogue for research themes found on the Nordic Science Center for Amateur Music' homepage: https://www.videncenterforamatoermusik.dk/index.php/english

The vision in the field of amateur music is to collect and promote research in the activities of voluntary amateur music life, and significance for and influence on the individual in a societal context with a focus on social, psychological aspects, creative and health aspects.

In short, our interest is to look at the health effects when pursuing music in various forms and constellations.
